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Course Description

This course will encompass the birth of the Methodist movement in England; the coming of Methodism to America; and the development of the Methodist Church in America as well as the impact of the African diaspora on the establishment of Black Methodism in general and particularly the African Methodist Episcopal Church (AME) and the African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church (AMEZ) during the pre and post Civil War periods. This course will examine the context out of which each of those communions were birth, with a specific emphasis on the Christian Methodist Episcopal Church from the periods of the mid 1800's to present day.

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon completing this course, as evidence of their commitment to academic discipline and scholarship, learners will be able to demonstrate the ability to:

- 1. Be able to articulate the founding and subsequent history of the Christian Methodist Episcopal Church.
- 2. Have a clear understanding of the shared values as it relates to the influence of various factors which led to its founding, i.e., the Methodist Episcopal Church, South; the Civil War and the so called "Black Codes" which impacted religious life among the slave and newly freed African.
- 3. Learners will also articulate the influence of Episcopal leadership on the church's growth and expansion.
- 4.Learners will also articulate the importance of education for the Christian Methodist Episcopal Church and its subsequent expansion since its founding.
- 5. Learners will also examine the socio-economic and political factors which led to the Church's founding and perhaps its ultimate founding leadership.
